**Certificate Course in Creative and Critical Thinking**

**Rationale for the course:** 

The main focus of the course is to provide the 10+2 level students of different socio-

cultural and linguistic backgrounds with the basic inputs to think critically and represent

ideas creatively. These learners in their secondary level are not properly trained in reading

and understanding literature. Thus, while dealing with a major course of literary studies they

find it extremely difficult to enjoy the subject. This foundational course is designed in a

simple learner-friendly way to feel at home with the degree course in literature that has its

strong grounding in a wide range of critical and creative issues, western classics and

aesthetics, a cross fertilization of ideas evolved through numerous cultural and art movements

of the ages. But the students in their secondary level have got little exposure to such a huge

field of critical and creative practice. Besides, experiences teach us that it requires some

preparatory lessons dealing with the basics of literature to perform well in literary studies

which has become quite interdisciplinary in nature. It is expected that the certificate course

will arouse genuine interest in reading of literature and also ability to respond critically to the

cross currents of thoughts and ideas inherent in it.

**Duration**: 1 year

**Target Group**: 12+ students aspiring to build a career in English Literature and humanities.

**Methodology of teaching**: Only preliminary knowledge will be imparted carefully avoiding

jargon and complex phenomenon involved in the select areas. Smart class rooms will be used

for taking the classes with digital teaching aids and e-resources where necessary. Guest

faculty specializing in art and film studies will be invited to engage the learners with

appropriate demonstration. A conventional lecture method will not serve the purpose and

stress must be on participatory, innovative teaching.

Evaluation Process: Besides periodical evaluation in participatory learning process there

shall be a paper of 75 marks for written examination and an assignment of 25 marks.

## **Syllabus**

## The units and learning values of the syllabus:

#### Unit I: Basics of the core areas

- 25 nefits
- a. What is literature, its fundamental assumptions and mode of representation, benefits of reading literature,
  - Associative components poetry, prose (fictional and non-fictional), drama, travel writings, biography, autobiography.
- b. Interdisciplinary lineage: paintings, human consciousness, psychology, folk culture, film studies, socio-historical and economic dynamics etc.
- c. Fundamental philosophical preoccupations with reference to Plato, Aristotle, Heidegger, Wittgenstein, Karl Marx, Hegel Jean Paul Satre, Nietzsche, M K Gandhi.
- d. Literary theorists and their ideas bearing on literary understanding.
- e. Practical demonstration on how to read a poem and its poetics

- f. How to read a novel and deal with the narrative art.
- g. Representation of critical issues of gender, identity, nature, nation, subalternity
- h. Basics of research in humanities

#### Unit II: Reading of select literary texts and reflection on its meaning

- a. Reading of poetry (representative texts may be selected from Greek, German, Spanish, American, British, Assamese, Bengali and Indian English poets).
- b. Excerpts from fictional prose narratives of Charles Dickens, Thomas Hardy, James Joyce, Birinchi Kumar Barua, Debendranath Acharya, Birendra Kumar Bhattacharya etc.
- c. Reading of a poem or a short excerpt with critical comments on the theme and style
- d. Reading of non-fiction prose excerpts from Bertrand Russell, Luis Borges Umberto Eco, Jawaharlal Nehru, Rabindranath Thakur, Lakshinath Bezbaroa, Banikanta Kakati, Krishna Kanta Handique, Hiren Gohain.

#### Unit III: Appreciation of film and paintings and other art forms

Every generation gets the writer it deserves – the way a reader experience literature /film is hugely affected by the historical contexts within which they are received. When we read Rabindranath Tagore's *Nastanirh* (The Broken Nest) and watch Satyajit Ray's Film adaptation of it, Charulata, we do not encounter the 'same' text.

- a. Adaptation Literature into Film
- b. Basics of the cinematic art
- c. Certain aspects of film appreciation with reference to Akira Kurosawa, Kiarostami, AndreiTarkovsky, Satyajit Roy, Mrinal Sen, Adoor Gopalkrisnan, Padum Barua, Jahnu Barua
- d. General introduction to paintings, its relation to literature and assessment of some renowned works of Van Gogh, Salvador Dali, Picasso, Frida kahlo, M F Hussain, Amrita Sher-Gil, Benu Misra, Neel Paban Barua, miniature paintings.
- e. Critical or creative response to some select pieces (students will try to respond to the content of a painting in terms of its expressive images, realism, motifs, symbolic representation.
- f. Listening to Interview and speech on art and literature
- g. Beauty of classical music and appreciation of literature

The students will be given some basic instruction in developing writing skill and the preliminary knowledge of following research methodology such as the use of foot notes, bibliography, and quotation in preparation of assignment.

- b. Poetry and philosophy
- c. Nation and narratives
- d. Appreciation of film
- e. Book Review
- f. Appreciation of a poem/novel
