#### 1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

#### 1.1 INTRODUCTION

Dr. B. K. B. College established in 1967 in a rural area is situated on the bank of the Kolong, a tributary of the Brahmaputra River, maintaining an excellent environment for teaching and learning with evergreen trees.

More than half a century experience in the field of higher education may well be considered a veritable source of social history and it has witnessed the gradual process of shifts and turns in higher education. Having struggled for several years with its limited expertise and resources, the college had qualified for grant-in-aid system in 1975 and subsequently included in the Sections 2(f) and 12(B) of UGC Act, 1956 in 1992.

The college as it stands today is characterised by expansion of courses, participation of faculties in question paper setting and evaluation process of Parent University, steady and consistent growth in enrolment and result, seminars, workshops, training programmes, awareness programmes, publication of books by the college, publication of articles/chapters in different books and UGC approved research journals, financial assistance to the needy and students, receiving grant for research project and faculty improvement programme, receiving of financial grant for infrastructure development and procurement of equipments, progression of students to higher education institutes and placement of students, participation of students in national and international events and their outstanding performances, extension and outreach programmes, installation of the life-size statue of Dr. Barua donated by the Alumni, etc. Thus, the institution's academic journey for more than half a century scripts its own history of achievement and failure as well.

Dr. B.K.B. College was first assessed and accredited by NAAC in 2004 with C++ grade followed by the 2nd cycle reaccreditation in 2011 at level C. The process of continuous assessment got delayed initially due to our preparation and year-long celebration of Golden Jubilee and then the outbreak of Covid-19 pandemic crisis.

The college is trying to fulfill most of the recommendations advocated by NAAC peer team in both the visits and it is trying to uplift itself to a new height as per the necessities of the present higher education scenario.

#### Vision

To impart higher education in UG level to the cross section of learners (basically belonging to the socio-economically backward communities) at an affordable cost through a syllabus designed by the parent university and a curriculum-extension interface at our own initiative.

#### Mission

- 1. To generate knowledge and develop cognitive abilities through well planned curriculum, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities, innovations in teaching learning environment and evaluation procedure.
- 2. To inculcate values and preserve socio-cultural identities, ensure equal development and to foster a sense of belongingness to the Nation.
- 3. To create the academic environment for promotion of scholastic and non-scholastic activities.
- 4. To promote the values of self-sustenance and self-reliance by introducing career-oriented programmes,

- vocational and cultural workshops, seminars etc. aiming at minimizing the burden of bookish knowledge.
- 5. To realize social needs and arouse awareness among the students regarding emerging new realities, environmental and other challenges.

#### 1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

#### **Institutional Strength**

- 1. The socio-economic and cultural features of the location with which the college has been working is our strength.
- 2. Its demography, rural life style, biodiversity can be a dynamic space for higher education to plan and execute skills for livelihood and transformation.
- 3. The interface that has been created so far with general and vocational curriculum strategically integrated with extension inputs may lead us to realisation of the new expectations of higher education.
- 4. The college tries to make the teaching learning situation grow keeping the learners at the centre. We give space to the students in academic, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities and administrative matters.
- 5. There is zero tolerance in issues of sexual harassment and ragging. The students (particularly NCC, NSS Volunteers) show up standard hospitality and event management.
- 6. Faculties are supportive in motivating the students even with financial support to pursue higher education.
- 7. The college has a great pool of talents in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities among the students. The students have showcased their talents in national and international level competitions.
- 8. Implimentation of E-Governance in different administrative works, financial transactions, admission process, examinations, feedback collection, student satisfaction survey, book issue and return in central library reflects transperancy and efficiency.
- 9. Use of ICT enabled tools in classroom teaching and online classes.
- 10. Mentor-Mentee system, in the name of BKBIAN Groups guides, supervised and monitored the students individually.

#### **Institutional Weakness**

The College has carved a niche in the arena of higher education in a rural area of Nagaon district, it has some inherent weaknesses and needs more dynamic orientation to face the challenges.

- 1. Impoverished demography and socio-economic features provide only relatively poor inputs. In terms of excellence and output, it causes major hindrance.
- 2. Insufficient capacity for resource mobilization and dependency on external funding agencies has been the institution's major weakness.
- 3. Smooth management of academic and administrative affairs need to be framed as one of the potential good practices.
- 4. The college offers only under graduate programmes to the students, it does not have any postgraduate programme.
- 5. The college has installed ICT facilities in few of the classrooms only.
- 6. Fail to sustain the Wi-Fi services at the college campus, because of scarcity of funds.

#### **Institutional Opportunity**

Previous experiences, socio-economic and cultural ambience of the local area where the college was established, changing socio, economic, cultural, ethical and academic perspective the college has to identify its opportunities for its overall development and growth.

- 1. The college has a great pool of talents in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities among the students. Proper training, workshops and competition along with modern infrastructure and other facilities can certainly boost their talents to grow.
- 2. Presence of highly qualified faculty members is a great opportunity that can be utilized by the college. The college appoints newly nine faculties against sanctioned vacant posts in the session: 2020-2021 and newly recruited faculties are the potential source for future growth. They have been trained with the changing pedagogy to deliver in better ways. Within a year this group of young dynamic minds has chalked out some concrete action plans that might have positive impacts upon the teaching learning environment of the college. Meanwhile two faculties have donated the physical requirements for an open library and used up garments for cloth banks respectively by the department of English and Education.

#### **Institutional Challenge**

- 1. We have to build up things where governance determines sustenance of quality and growth.
- 2. NEP 2020 demands concentrated approach to a regime of knowledge-skill interface for which the vocational component recently introduced needs further planning and expansion.
- 3. Attempts so far to introduce post-graduation courses in certain departments are yet to take a concrete shape.

#### 1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

#### **Curricular Aspects**

The College has moved forward with a relatively dynamic and need-based curricular focus in terms of expansion of course and inculcation of skills, values and employment potentialities. In addition to the seven departments with honours three more subjects were introduced viz. Performing Arts (*Sattriya* Dance), Sociology and Psychology as regular degree course with due permission from the parent university. In the session 2020-2021, it has introduced Physical Education and Information Technology under B. Voc. Programme in CBCS mode with approval from UGC and permission from the parent university. The commerce stream with honours was introduced in self-financing mode and it is expected that the stream will function in right earnest once it is brought under Govt's scheme of provincialization. Besides this initiative, the college has introduced five certificate and diploma courses on different subjects such as Cosmetology, Sattriya Dance, Project Report Preparation, Creative and Critical Thinking, Art of Speaking and Writing in English along with the courses on Computer Application and Yoga for Health. The academic ambience of the college is not just confined to the syllabus designed by the parent university. There has been a serious effort on our part to give it a broad based frame of curriculum-extension interface where the teaching-learning situation is carefully hoisted to a wider space to generate the core value of higher education. Besides, steps are taken to tap on the scope for experiential learning available within the courses such as field trips and field inputs in several honours and

regular subjects.

Feedbacks on syllabus and curriculum development are collected every year by IQAC from the students to strengthen the quality of teaching-learning environment of the college. Feedbacks from the parents and alumni are also collected on the facilities and services provided by the college to the students. After receiving RUSA Grant, the feedbacks are collected through online platform, i.e. through college website and recently feedbacks are also collected from the faculties of the college and employers of the alumni with a view to analyse the growth of the institution along with to scrutinize the functioning of all the organs of the college.

#### **Teaching-learning and Evaluation**

The College has a prospective mobility in terms of enrolment, recruitment of teachers, research achievement of faculties, internal and external evaluation and pass percentage during the last five years. There is no alarming gap between enrolled number and intake capacity which shows an average figure of 1108. The average pass percentage has remained at 66% including the Covid-19 pandemic period (48% in 2019-2020 Session). In the area of research by the faculties it is satisfactory compared to the figure during earlier two cycles. Altogether 16 sanctioned and permanent faculties out of 24 (67%) have done Ph.D. and many of the remaining faculties are pursuing their Ph.D. from different universities. It is mentionable that one faculty has published a book based on his thesis dealing with a comprehensive study of B.K. Barua's creative and critical works and many of these research works are cited as reference in different related research works carried out in different parts of the world, which reflects the quality of these works. The students' Satisfaction Survey was conducted in online mode by IQAC for the Sessions: 2019-2020 and 2020-2021, and the reports prepared thereof are submitted at the office of Principal and discussed the reports at the Governing Body meeting for appropriate action.

#### Research, Innovations and Extension

There is no substantial amount of resource mobilization for conducting any major research project so far. Only nine faculties have received UGC grant against Minor Research Projects and two FIPs in the department of Assamese and Education. Our faculty Seema Sovita Das has recently received fellowship of 3.6 lakhs for her Ph.D works sponsored jointly by Axom Sahitya Sabha (the highest Literary Organisation of the state) and University of Science and Technology, Meghalaya. During the period of last five years, the college has organized 52 numbers of seminars, workshops and lecture and training programmes, total number of articles published in UGC care listed Journals including Scopus Indexed is 49 and 116 numbers of articles in ISBN books and chapters in edited books have been published by the faculties of the college. The extension activities (total 57) conducted by NCC, NSS, IQAC, Women Forum, Students' Union have mostly dealt with issues of cleanliness (of late swascha Bharat Abhiyan), control of tobacco consumption, cancer prevention, Flood relief, plantation drive, awareness for blood and organ donation, self-employment and gender equity. Each of these programmes is attended by around 100 participants. Some of the extension programmes are conducted in collaboration with different educational institutes or organisations, like - district health department, Nehru Yuva Kendra, IIT Guwahati, neighbouring colleges and higher secondary schools, etc. and 23 numbers of programmes are organized under institutional linkage programmes, like-faculty exchange, students exchange, field trips and training. The college has signed MoUs with various neighbouring educational and other institutes and 17 MoUs are functional presently and different activities are organized under these MoUs.

#### **Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

The College has made certain noticeable progress particularly in the use of ICT tools in class room teaching after receiving grants under RUSA. There has been greater amount of improvement in the physical infrastructure in terms of new construction, renovation and augmentation, class rooms being equipped with interactive smart board, over head projectors with sound and Wi-Fi facilities. Internal and external audit has covered the entire period when the college got grants from external agencies like UGC, RUSA, State Govt. and others. The college library has been partially digitalized with installation of SOUL 2.0 and making e-resources accessible to the users through NLIST and institutional repository. Issue, return and stock verification have been digitally conducted through OPAC module. Besides the central library, each department has developed its own mechanism to serve the needs of the learners by providing books, reference, laboratory assistance, sharing of e-resources in PDF and other formats and engaging the students on virtual platform through college website. Of late the department of English has introduced an open library facilities for the students which provide open access to learning materials and the department of Education has introduced a Cloth Bank where the needy students can pick up a piece of seasonal garment at their choice.

#### **Student Support and Progression**

It associated with the basic principles of justice and equity in imparting higher education to rural learners. A huge segment of aspiring students has been benefited by various Scholarship and Freeship schemes made available to the socially-economically disadvantaged students during the assessment period. The students availing benefit of the Admission and Tuition Fee Waiver Scheme introduced recently by the State Government of Assam along with those students belonged to OBC, ST, SC and Minority Community through different Central and State Government sponsored scholarships and covering also the meritorious students under Ishan Uday Scholarship. In addition to it, the college has evolved a mechanism at its own to provide financial assistance from Corpus Fund, Women Forum, Poor Fund and Sports and Cultural Fund to address the academic matters, medical expenditure, and accidental expenditure, extra-curricular and co-curricular activities of the students. Skill generation in a course of study mostly dealing with the humanities has been a tough job in the true sense. But, they have learnt through the existing curriculum with experiencial learning to manage extracurricular or co-curricular activities such as celebration of important days, cultural events, freshmen social, annual college week, editing college magazine and wall magazines, fostering democratic spirit in contesting election and so on. Moreover, the departments have introduced some short term certificate courses with specific focus on skill generation. The college has been periodically organizing coaching classes targeting our students to crack entry examinations for various jobs like TET and other state government examinations. Activities under Yoga Cell are quite encouraging and some students have performed excellently well in national and international Yoga events. Panchee Bora is such a brilliant student, an accomplished performer who is now pursuing masters at Guwalior. Our athletes (Ahadur Hoque, Amlanjyoti G. Momin, Madhurjya Bora, Padunya Tamuli, Dipankar Barik, Diganta Phukan, Binti Bora, etc.) have represented our college in national and international mega events. Recently Binti Bora could claim the 3rd position (69 kg, Junior Category) in 47th National Powerlifting Championship, 2022. Recently introducing the programme of Physical Education under B.Voc. provides a platform to showcase their talents at different levels of competition.

#### Governance, Leadership and Management

Good governance in terms of justice, equity, fair management of academic and administrative affairs is instrumental to achieving the desired goal in higher education. The college has developed a mechanism and thereby has monitored and rendered the best possible efforts to maintain commitment and accountability, gears up appropriate measures to make it sustainable. Besides, inadequate fund and inability to generate additional

resources have remained the stumbling block in realizing our mission. Nevertheless there is an honest effort and sincere commitment to our set goals which will be clear in the representations in this criterion. First of all there has been a gradual process of e-governance already introduced in the areas of admission (filling up forms, submitting details and remitting the amount to be paid), applying for leave by the faculty, registering complaint and grievances by the students, online classes, issuing pass certificates, library management, etc. have so far been initiated using website and digital means.

There is a faculty and student encouragement strategy and financial assistance is provided encouraging faculties to attend seminar, workshop, etc. and also towards paying membership fee of professional bodies. Students participating in placement drives, youth festival, and outdoor events representing the college are paid for the basic expenses. The Principal takes genuine interest in connecting with the institutions and organizations and the leading citizens of the local society by providing college infrastructure and academic expertise and also signing MoU for mutual collaboration. The secular credential is strictly maintained and no communal sectarian attitude is entertained.

#### **Institutional Values and Best Practices**

Institutional values and best practices are the unique and distinctive features that offer the institution a separate identity. This is inherent in the innovative strategies, volume of works done and priorities given. While transacting academic and administrative affairs with the students in a rural set up the college has to attend upon certain norms, a code of conduct. Sensitization on gender equity is one such area where the teaching learning family made aware of through responsible rendering of duty, ensuring participation of students in scholastic and non-scholastic programmes, taking care of cleanliness, health and hygiene, equal participation in all events and programmes, ensuring justice to the students by promptly delivering service and benefits.

Institutional values need to implement measures ensuring green technology for waste management, solar source for electricity, power efficient equipments and many others. The college has introduced solar light in the campus and LED bulbs, steps for periodical cleaning drive and green coverage. Some steps have been taken to make the buildings and support centres disable friendly for hazard free movement by connecting them with ramp, parallel bars in the toilet and washrooms for support and easy movement.

Finally, the college has tried to create an environment of openness and free access giving exposure to the creative and critical minds of the state. Celebrating important days, inviting eminent persons to deliver memorial lecture, presenting Dr. B.K.B. College award to a distinguished person excelling in the field of folklore, folk culture, regional history and environment protection, introducing certificate courses for experiential learning, connecting the community with innovative programmes like GALPAKOTHA (a story telling event with relishes of classical music) and orientation programmes and recently the college introduced Vice Principal's Interactive Session with the students in a series of events to make them aware of the facilities available, to feel at home while approaching the people in administration, raise voice for justice.

#### **Institutional preparedness for NEP**

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:

Dr. B.K.B. College, Puranigudam, Nagaon has to set higher goals ahead to achieve success under NEP 2020. Creating a space for multidisciplinary mobility and thereby ensuring fresh entries and skilled output shall require autonomy and resources. But the existing streams of Arts, Commerce and B.Voc. (though the last two are in self financing mode) along with a couple of Diploma and Certificate courses have scope for multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary academic exercises to some extent. Several new certificate courses are announced by the departments for the session 2022-2023. Through careful selection of courses and subjects within its limited choices the learners can go through a multidisciplinary or

interdisciplinary deal at present. Engagements through inter-departmental faculty exchange programmes and exposure to socio-political, cultural and environmental issues through Memorial Lecture, conferment of Dr. B.K.B College Award, reaching out to the community with NCC and NSS volunteers, additional orientation towards knowledge-skill interface through Diploma and Certificate courses constitute the core area of Knowledge sharing and the institution's holistic approach for the learners. There is some scope for experiential learning which is undertaken by the students through various activities like Field Works, Extension Works, project report and assignment preparation. Opening of the Science Stream at the UG level and incorporating some other subjects in arts stream, provincialisation of Commerce and B.Voc. are some of the priorities Dr. B.K.B. College need to work on. It will take time to realize such a holistic approach with academic flexibility and knowledge-skill interface.

#### 2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

Dr. B.K.B. College like any HEIs has been pursuing the CBCS model of education in UG level and has rather an orthodox mechanism of maintaining credit records of students. But the new concept of ABC is the latest innovative mechanism to connect several institutes and thereby to ensure flexibility through separate ID number for a learner to have access to courses of study at his/her choice. Accordingly an institute will have to reserve certain percentage of seats for lateral entries. Dr. B.K.B. College has certain range of subjects (such as Performing Art, Sociology, Psychology and subjects under B.Voc., diploma and certificate courses) that might be chosen by learners enrolled somewhere else. As we follow a blended mode of online and offline teaching-learning mechanism, accessibility to it can be managed. But Academic Bank of Credit through a portal is yet to be introduced. As the college website has been of a dynamic nature these issues will not be difficult to address. The institution is already in a position to advocate access, openness, fluidity and flexibility in the education system after several years of engagement with the Semester and CBCS systems. Students too have been adapted to a system of egovernance. All examination related activities, lodging a complaint or grievance, uploading assignment through college website, payment of fees,

attending online classes, applying for provisional certificates through college website online, submission of Feedback, submission of Student Satisfaction Survey (SSS), etc. are performed through online modules. Thus the student can avail a smooth Academic Bank of Credit process on the courses offered in the college with the implementation of New Education Policy 2020.

#### 3. Skill development:

There is little scope in humanities to show how certain values learnt and experiences gathered enable the learners to face the real life situations. Internalization of values of integration, gender equity, tolerance and knowledge of indigenous ecology, culture, society, economy, geography, history, etc. prepare a learner to deliver in the right earnest. Even in the existing courses there is scope for harnessing skills beyond pedagogical overload. Questions of employability in present situation predicate the inculcation of ready-to-use soft skills which, however, is not noticeable in the purview of humanities. Instead, the skill generated here is situational, critical and creative. But keeping in view the emerging scenario of unemployment our college has introduced B.Voc. Degree and Diploma courses for skill-enhancement and employability to create selfemployed young citizens. Meanwhile, students pursuing Diploma courses in cosmetology, performing art and computer application have got interest in choosing a career. The certificate courses including those to be introduced from the next session are expected to bridge the gap till a wellcoordinated vocational course is designed under NEP 2020. Most of our students belonging to rural ethos has been naturally adapted to and tuned with weaving and culinary skills, indigenous art and craft. There is immense scope for orienting our students in diverse field like Cutting, Knitting and Tailoring, Food Processing and Food Preservation, Beauty Therapy and Hair Cutting, Poultry Management and Entrepreneurship Development. New Education Policy speaks about reorienting the learners with learning by doing and also instilling passion for creative imagination and critical thinking in a way that the endeavor doesn't end up with pedagogical abstraction. We introduced a course three years back on creative and critical thinking deliberating on inculcation of sense and skills to appreciate arts and

	craft, classical music and paintings, etc. As a part of soft skill enhancement we have courses like data analysis and project report preparation, Art of speaking and writing in English, Certificate Course on Computer Application, etc.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	The existing CBCS syllabi in humanities have incorporated issues and concerns that connect ancient Indian aesthetics, literature, socio-political thought, education system and value system. Under CBCS for example, the learners pursuing English honours find two papers, one on western aesthetics and literature and the other on Indian aesthetics, drama and epic narratives. Thus the components of Indian knowledge system incorporated in the curricula instill a sense of rootedness and pride among the students regarding rich traditions of Indian knowledge system. Yoga for health is a course which has been designed in tune with present needs and spectacular achievements through Yoga in the past.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	The changing socio-economic conditions have put additional responsibility to cope up with specific outcome based education. Skill components in existing CBCS course of studies will be identified and faculties need to be oriented towards realizing it with more focus on FDP. The institution has to plan and design new courses and redesigns the ongoing courses to produce targeted skill-based outcome. This is at our own strength with limited resources. The parent university is expected to provide new course of studies based on the policy formulations in NEP 2020 and the institution will have its own choice depending upon the local potentials and scope.
6. Distance education/online education:	The college has been conducting two centers for distance education- Krishna Kanta Handique State Open University (KKHSOU), which operates the undergraduate course and IDOL under Gauhati University for post graduate courses. The college will develop digital Self-Learning Materials (SLMs) to felicitate online learning. Development of digital library with learning materials in audio-visual forms by the faculty members has been our top priority. The certificate courses introduced by the college are conducted switching on to online mode.

- The students are made aware of the result of the Sessional Examination through the Departmental Notice board, Whastapp Group within a week and through the college website.
- The HoDs and office staff submits the result of the Sessional Examination to GU in prescribed format.
- A full-fledged Examination Committee is constituted to conduct the Semester End Examination.
- Based on their performance in the internal assessment and classroom experiences, **remedial classes for slow learners and tutorial classes for advanced learners** are departmentally arranged.
- Evaluated answer scripts are shown to the students so that they get to know the mistakes committed and the ways of rectifying those mistakes.
- Every Meet of the Governing Body, Academic Committee, IQAC and Mentor-Mentee keep 'Discussion on Academic Matters' in its agenda.

#### 2.3.2 Teachers use ICT enabled tools for effective teaching-learning process.

#### **Response:**

Stress has been on the use of ICT tools in the classroom since the Academic year 2018-19 at Dr. B.K.B. College with a view to making teaching learning environment more interesting, more interactive and more learner-centered. ICT is merely a tool, and the teacher with all his/her pedagogical knowledge and experiences and control over the use of technology is the key to impart higher education through ICT tools in an interesting way to the target group and to make the students learn, find, explore, analyse, exchange and present information responsibly and creatively.

- ICT Facilities: Nine (9) classrooms equipped with Smart board with Projector, CPU, scanner and Mini Sound Modifier, two extra projector and four digital podiums with speaker, laptop in every department, internet facility, Video Conferencing Set, Digital Repository, subscription to NLIST, up-to-date GIS laboratory and a Computer Lab are in service.
- MoU with ICT Academy
- .FDP organised on the Use of ICT in November, 2018.
- Faculties attending FDP and Training on use of ICT.
- Orientation Programme conducted for Online Examination on 30th and 31st May, 2021.
- Online Classes are conducted during Lockdown and also in the post lockdown period.
- Use of E-Resources: Almost all the faculties have the subscriptions of NLIST and most of the students have registered themselves under the National Digital Library of India. Teachers and students use the web based public Catalogue which include virtual library and e-resources like e-books, e-journals and e-databases.
- Use of PPT and Video Classes: Almost all the faculties give power-point presentations in their classes using smart board. The faculties have been using the Audio clipping, Video class, Blended and Flipped classroom providing opportunities to the students to gain advanced knowledge and practical learning.
- Use of Social Media: Every department has WhatsApp group for the students of every semester and provide them TLM and necessary instruction through the said groups. Further College You Tube Channel, Departmental and personal you tube channels are also used.
- Use of College Website: The faculties using the college website take online classes, provide TLM and give Assignments, while the students receive TLM, submit Assignments and get information regarding admission, examination etc. through college website.
- **SSS and Feedbacks:** SSS and Feedbacks are received through college portal and analyzed by using different software like Excel and SPSS.
- Webinar/Talk/Lecture Session are organised during lockdown and post lockdown period with satisfactory participation of students.
- PTM, Mentor-Mentee Meet, Alumni Meet are also conducted online with good response.

Dr. B.K.B. College never claims any excellence in the use of ICT tools in the classrooms but decides to sustain it as one of its best practices on the ground that the tools increase students' motivation, connect them to reliable information sources and create active in-class and out-class learning environment. The college administration needs to motivate the teachers, sustain their training, incorporate ICT into curriculum and make it a culture of the institution.

#### 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

#### 2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode

#### **Response:**

- Dr. B.K.B. College follows an **Internal Assessment Policy** that makes its internal assessment system transparent and robust in terms of nature, frequency and mode. The internal assessment system of the college is three dimensional comprising of Assignment and others, Attendance and Sessional Examination following the **Evaluation Policy prescribed by the parent university**.
- **1. Assignment and others**: The HoDs of the departments prescribes assignments/Projects/Seminar presentation with the marks kept for the same to the students of the departments concerned and makes them aware of the same through classroom interaction, notice board and whatsapp groups. The students are awarded 30% of the marks allotted for Internal Assessment on the basis of their performance on Home Assignment/ Seminar/Group Discussion/ Field Work/Performance in Co-curricular or Extra-Curricular activities.
- **2. Attendance**: The HoDs also make the students aware of the marks kept for attendance in the classroom interaction and calculate the same at the end of the semester. 20% of the marks allotted for Internal Assessment is to be kept for Attendance.

- **3. Sessional Examination**: The Academic Committee of the college announces the dates for the sessional examination adhering to the tentative dates announced in the Academic calendar and makes the students aware of the same through Notice Boards and other available means. Remaining 50% of the marks allotted for Internal Assessment of a paper is kept for Sessional Examination.
  - The principal constitutes internal examination committee for the session and appoints AOCs for the same.
  - The internal examination committee prepares the schedules for sessional examination and makes the students aware of the same through notice boards and departmental WhatsApp groups..
  - The HODs are instructed to set question papers for the courses concern and submit the same to the AOCs. And the AOCs print the number of question papers as required according to the report of students' strength submitted by the HODs.
  - The AOCs prepare the list of invigilation duty strictly maintaining inter-departmental invigilation policy.
  - The AOCs with the help of office staff arrange answer scripts, prepare the seat plans and get ready the rooms for conducting sessional examination.
  - The invigilators keep the records of attendance of students appearing in the sessional examination in the attendance register of the department concerned provided by the HODs.
  - The concerned faculties of the departments receive and examine the answer scripts and the HODs scrutinize the same and declare the result within a week.
  - The students are also made aware of the result through the departmental notice board, WhatsApp Group and college website.
  - The absentees, unsuccessful ones and those looking for betterment on genuine ground apply for resessional examination and the HODs conduct the same and declare the result as early as possible.
  - Evaluated answer scripts are shown to the students so that they get to know the mistakes committed and the ways of rectifying those mistakes.
  - The HoDs and office staff submits the result of the Sessional Examination to GU in prescribed format.

### 2.5.2 Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

#### **Response:**

The internal assessment system of Dr. B.K.B. College is three dimensional comprising of Assignment and others, Attendance and Sessional Examination following the **Evaluation Policy prescribed by the parent university**. The college authority follows a transparent time effective and efficient mechanism to deal with Internal Assessment with certain flexible procedure to address the genuine grievances of the students. Grievances related to Internal Assessment are addressed as follows:

- The students are also made aware of all **Information regarding Internal Assessment related to** Assignment and others, Attendance and Sessional Examination through classroom interactions, notice boards, WhatsApp Group and college website.
- The **grievances associated with Home Assignment**/ Seminar/Group Discussion/ Field Work/ Performance in Co-curricular or Extra-Curricular activities are addressed by the HoDs in consultation with the faculty members of the department concerned within a week. If the students are found not satisfied with the marks awarded for the same they are advised to submit the same in a better way and marks are awarded accordingly.
- The grievances associated with Attendance and marks awarded to the students for the same are also addressed by the HoDs in consultation with the faculty members of the department concerned keeping in view the genuine grounds of poor attendance of the complainants. In such cases the matter is sent to the authority for approval.
- The Sessional Examination Committee conducts the Sessional Examination as scheduled by the Academic Committee. As instructed by the said committee the Departments set the question papers, evaluate and scrutinize the answer scripts and declare the result within a week from the last date of examination. The students are also made aware of the result through the departmental notice board, WhatsApp Group and college website.
- The students are generally encouraged to **check their answer scripts** of sessional examination, the marks awarded for Assignments and attendance. **Any discrepancy noticed** is immediately addressed by the department concerned.
- The absentees and the students who either fail to secure pass marks or look for betterment on genuine ground apply for **Resessional Examination** and the HODs conduct the same and declare the result as early as possible.
- Any grievance received related to internal assessment is always read from students' point of view and is addressed **immediately and sympathetically, transparently and efficiently.**
- The HoDs and office staff submit the result of the Sessional Examination to GU in prescribed format.
- The grievance regarding wrong entry of the marks of Internal Assessment in the Final Marksheet awarded by Parent University is communicated to the Parent University with a forwarding from the college authority.

#### 2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 Teachers and students are aware of the stated Programme and course outcomes of the Programmes offered by the institution.

#### **Response:**

**Program Outcomes (POs)** are general statements describing the professional achievements targeted by the programme, and the students are expected to achieve the programme outcomes on the completion of

the programme. POs basically represent the knowledge, skills and personality traits and the attitudes what the students are expected to acquire during their graduation.

**Program specific outcomes (PSOs)** are the specific skills and competency to be met by the students of the Programme at micro level by the end of the curriculum. The HoDs of the departments and the coordinators of the self financing courses highlight the PSOs while preparing the POs in consultation with the faculty members and finally communicate the PSOs to the students concerned and orient them towards achieving the same.

Course outcomes (COs) are straightforward statements that outline the core knowledge, capabilities and skills that the students are expected to possess while going through a particular paper/course of a particular programme. The COs for a few courses/papers of the programmes offered are prepared and prescribed with the syllabus by the parent university and for the remaining courses/papers of all programmes COs are prepared by the HoDs in consultation with faculty members and communicated the same to the students concerned. The Programme Outcomes (POs), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs) and Course Outcomes (COs) for all the programmes offered by the institution are communicated to teachers and students as follows -

- Before commencement of each semester the Academic Committee comprising of Principal, Vice Principal, HoDs, IQAC Coordinator and Students' Representative have discussion on POs, PSOs and COs and finalise the same.
- In the beginning of each semester the HoDs have discussion with faculty members on POs, PSOs and COs and prepare the measures for attaining the same on the part of the students.
- In the beginning of each semester the Vice Principal and IQAC Coordinator take part in Orientation Programme with students and make them aware of POs, PSOs and COs and motivate them to attain the same.
- In the beginning of each semester the HoDs and faculty members make the students aware of POs and PSOs in the departmental orientation programme with students.
- The faculty members make the students aware of COs in the classrooms while dealing with the papers assigned and review the same after completion of the syllabus of the paper concerned.
- The POs, PSOs and COs are disseminated through college website, departmental notice boards and whatsapp groups
- POs and PSOs are also kept in noticeable locations of the departments concerned.
- The POs, PSOs and COs are also the subjects of discussion in the Parent Teacher Meets, Mentor-Mentee Meets.

#### 2.6.2 Attainment of programme outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated by the institution.

#### **Response:**

Dr. B.K.B College adopted the CBCS curriculum as approved by parent University which is based on Learning Outcome-based Curriculum Framework (LOCF). The methods/strategies of measuring of attainment of POs, PSOs and COs followed by Dr. B.K.B. College are Blooms Taxonomy, Direct and Indirect Assessment Methods, Preparatory, Formative and Summative methods etc.

- The institution has a clearly defined mechanism for measuring attainment of POs, PSOs, and COs at the end of every course and programme offered by the institution as per affiliating university.
- The mechanism prepared by the parent university includes both internal and end-semester evaluation and the institution adopt it for measuring the attainment of the Programme and course outcome.
- While measuring the attainment the institution streamlines the evaluation mechanism in three tier-Preparatory Evaluation, Formative Evaluation and Summative Evaluation. The three tier mechanism is schematically shown below:



Formative Evaluation (sessional and re-sessional examination, assignments, group discussion, field study, seminar presentation)

Summative evaluation( End semester examination/ project viva/laboratory practical)

- The whole attainment process includes direct as well as indirect assessment methods and technique. The direct assessment includes honours/major entrance test, sessional examination, and re-sessional examination, assignments, group discussion, field study, and seminar presentation. End semester examination/ project viva/laboratory practical conducted by the affiliating university also comes under the umbrella of direct assessment tools.
- The indirect assessment tools include feedback from the students and alumni, Students Satisfactory Survey report (SSS), students progress to higher education and students employability
- The institution while setting question paper is based on cognitive domain of Bloom's Taxonomy for internal evaluation.
- Apart from the following cognitive domain of Bloom's Taxonomy in setting sessional question papers, the institution follows the taxonomy in developing and evaluating HOTS (Higher Order Thinking Skills) through assignment, group discussion, seminar presentation.
- The affective domain of Bloom's taxonomy well reflected through UG programme in Assamese, English, Sattriya as a Performing Arts and certificate courses in Critical thinking, Diploma in Sattriya dance etc. - this aspect is evaluated through curricular and extension activities

- Sattriya as performing art, B.Voc in IT and Physical Education are taught and evaluated based on psycho-motor domain of Bloom's Taxonomy. Further Certificate Courses in Art of speaking and writing in English and diploma in Sattriya dance are assessed on this aspect.
- Academic and administrative Audit is done every academic session.
- Analysis of institutional result is done and every department analyses the result and methods and strategies of measuring POs, PSOs, COs.

#### 4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

#### **Response:**

Dr. B.K.B College, Puranigudam has constantly endeavored to provide quality education to the students with the limited infrastructure and physical facilities available and always puts stress on the optimal use of the same for teaching learning purposes and curriculum extension interface. The college campus is set on 2.45 acres divided into 2 campus and a new site on the opposite of college.

#### Infrastructural facilities for Academic Activities:

- There are 22 nos of classrooms.
- 09 nos of classrooms equipped with Smart Board with Projector, CPU, Scanner and Mini sound Modifier.
- 02 nos of projector equipped classrooms.
- The college has 1 seminar cum conference room.
- There are 4 laboratories: GIS laboratory, Computer laboratory, Instrumentation laboratory of Education & Psychology department and Practical Lab of Performing Art department.
- The college campus is partially Wi-Fi enabled. There are 72 computers for administrative and academic purposes.
- The college has a common staff room with LCD installed for meeting and discussion.
- Besides these, each department has its own room provided with a Laptop and a departmental library.
- The college has one auditorium with a seating capacity of 200.
- 01 generator installed within the campus.
- Central library partially automated and is also equipped with digital repository.

- The practical Lab of Sattriya department is maintained by the department concerned.
- There is systematic procedures for procurement of lab equipments by Purchase committee in consultation with concerned departments.

### Library:

- The central library of the college is maintained by the librarian assisted by her staffs.
- A library Committee consisting of Principal, Librarian and teaching faculty discusses on the improvement /update of facilities provided by the library.
- The responsibility of listing out books (text books, references etc) is taken in consultation with different departments keeping in mind student's demand.
- The Library committee looks after activities like book purchase, budget allocation and maintenance of infrastructure and physical facilities of the library.
- For proper maintenance and security, CCTV has been installed to monitor the movement of those who visits the library.
- Every year in the beginning of session students are oriented towards the use of library, rules and regulations.
- To ensure return of books "No Dues Form" from library is mandatory in absence of which students are not provided final graduation certificate.
- A visitor register is maintained to keep the record of library visitors both students and teachers.

#### **Sports**:

- A sports committee comprising of 2 faculties and games secretary of student union body holds meetings and monitor sports infrastructure.
- The Gymkhana is maintained properly by a Gymnasium Committee with an instructor and helper. The gymnasium Committee with Faculty-in-Charge, professional trainer, gym secretary of student union body ensures that the equipments are in perfect working condition.
- The college has a sports store room with sports equipment for different sports.
- The college has signed MoU with Bapuji library committee for utilisation of playground and the field is maintained by Bapuji library committee members and college authority.



Dr. B.K.B. College follows a policy of decentralization and participative management as shown in the above diagrammatic presentation incorporating different stakeholders at different levels of management and administration. The Governing Body, the apex policy making body and the Principal cum Secretary lead from the front keeping adequate space for all other stakeholders to work on the activities assigned.

### Admission: A Case Study showing decentralization and participative management:

Admission or enrollment of students to a new session in various programmes is one of the prime practice or activity of higher educational institution that makes it run. Dr. B.K.B. College follows specific admission. As a part of the Admission process the Academic Committee with the help of IQAC and HoDs prepares the Prospectus and Academic Calendar for the session concerned. Further the IQAC prepares the new letter 'Khobornama' to be distributed to the students admitted on the day of admission. An Admission Committee is constituted for the purpose reflecting the tradition of decentralization and ensuring participation of all –

- 9. Involvement of all members of teaching and non-teaching staff on the days of Admission.

The Admission Committee declares the schedule of admission and assigns duty to all concerned defining works to be done at different level. If the Convener convenes the meetings of admission and leads the process from the front keeping in touch with the authority, the coordinator/member of IQAC working as the Coordinator of Admission committee leads the technicalities associated with right preparation, submission and verification of online forms being assisted by other members appointed for. With the help of the members from ST/SC/OBC/Minority cells appointed as members of the Admission committee the Convener and the Coordinator prepare the List of Selected Students following the norms of reservation. On the dates of Admission fixed by the Admission Committee the authority appoints all faculties and members of non-teaching staff for counseling for offering Honour and Certificate Courses, verification of original certificates and mark sheets, caste certificates, income certificates and payment procedure. All these personnel participate in a pleasurable way with a view to getting the inputs admitted to different programmes offered and thus making the entire process fruitful.

## 6.2.2 The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment, service rules and procedures, etc.

### **Response:**

As reflected in the Organogram, Dr. B.K.B. College has primarily two-tier system of governance. One is administrative and the other is academic. At the administrative level, the Governing Body operates as the apex body. At the academic level, the Principal is the ultimate authority who is also the Secretary of Governing Body. The Principal is assisted in all administrative and academic matters by the Vice Principal, HoDs, IQAC and other in-house bodies.

### **Governing Body:**

- o Governing Body is the apex policy making body headed by a President
- Principal is the Secretary of the GB
- The Vice Principal is the ex officio member of the GB
- Two university representatives are parts of it
- Both male and female guardian members are involved in this Body
- Librarian and a member from non-teaching staff are too involved in the GB
- Two teacher representatives are members in the GB

### **Administrative Setup:**

- Administrative infrastructure is headed by the Principal, followed by the Vice Principal and HoDs of various departments
- Departmental setup is headed by the HoD, followed by Associate Professors and Assistant Professors

- The senior-most faculty is normally appointed as HoD of a department on rotation basis
- The formal organizational structure of the library staff consists of the librarian, library assistant and the library bearers

## **College In-house bodies:**

- Different in-house bodies play an active and vital role in owning of different responsibilities and execution of assigned activities inside the college campus.
- Every in-house body is headed by a Convener / Coordinator, preferably a senior teacher, assisted by other members, including students to some extent
- Principal is the Chairperson of some of these bodies

#### **Service Rules:**

• The service rules laid down by the competent authority (UGC, DHE Assam) for the permanent teachers are strictly followed in appointment, promotion and granting leaves etc. The service rules of the contractual staff are framed and governed by the college authority in tune with standard practices and notifications.

### **Procedure for Recruitment:**

#### • Permanent Posts:

All fresh recruitments are made in a transparent manner following latest guidelines as framed by UGC and Assam Govt. Advertisement seeking application from competent candidates is published at least in two leading newspapers. In some cases, advertisement is also circulated through college website. In case of non-teaching staff, appointment is done as per State Govt. guidelines. Approved procedure is followed in Promotion of teaching and non-teaching staff. In both cases, the college authority after due screening recommends promotion of a concerned employee to the Govt. for necessary approval through DHE, Assam.

### • Temporary and Full-time contractual teachers:

Appointments to various self-financing departments and programmes are made by the college authority through proper interview and required procedure

### **Procedure for Promotion:**

- Promotions are made according to UGC rules/ Government of Assam, through Departmental Promotion Committees (DPC), held as and when such necessity arises

## **6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies**

### 6.3.1 The institution has effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff

### **Response:**

The administration of Dr. B.K.B. College is committed to undertake a number of welfare measures for the teaching as well as non-teaching staff. The facilities, provided to all members of the college fraternity, indicate good governance from the part of the administration whereby active participation of all members in a feel free congenial atmosphere is ensured and preparedness with adequate engagements is encouraged. - **3.** Corpus Fundis fully functioning at college whereby non-sanctioned teachers and fourth grade employees are financially assisted whenever demands rise
- **4. Group insurance system**is provided to all permanent faculties under govt. guidelines and schemes
- **5. Group salary link insurance** system is also provided to all permanent faculties
- **6. Online leave facility**is a recent addition whereby all employees of the college can access the online college portal to apply for leave
- 7. Special leave facility is provided to the employees on the grounds of demise of parents
- **8. Financial Assistance** to Non-Sanctioned Teachers for attending FDP, Workshop, Seminar etc.
- **9. Financial Assistance** to Sanctioned Teachers for attending FDP, Workshop, Seminar etc.
- 10. Women's Aidis operative at college to address issues and aspects concerned with lady staff

### 6.3.5 Institutions Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff

### **Response:**

Dr. B.K.B. College maintains a dynamic performance appraisal system for the teaching and non-teaching staff separately. In order to keep good record of performance, a few procedures and systems are followed by the college authority.

To appraise the performance of the **teaching staff**, the college formulates the following practices:—

- Academic Diary: In every department, the concerned HoDs keep records of daily academic and non-academic activities of all faculties in an Academic Diary. The faculties of all departments maintain their daily activities (attending classes, organizing seminars, participating activities outside the institution, conducting examinations, co-curricular activities, departmental programmes etc.) in the departmental Academic Diary and the HoDs of the concerned departments, after verifying the activities of the faculties, finalize the diaries on daily basis. This practice of keeping records through Academic Diaries is appraised by the authority / IQAC in a periodic mode.
- Activity Record Register: All departments, committees and cells of the college are provided with an Activity Record Register where account of various activities / events is recorded on a regular basis and periodically the authority apprises them in consultation with IQAC and to some extent the Governing Body of the institution.
- **Feedback System**: The Feedback System of the college provides a clear picture about the performance of all faculties in various activities, especially activities related to teaching-learning processes. This mode of assessment through collecting feedbacks from the students results in proper handling of drawbacks coming under scholastic areas like attendance of faculties in the class, quality of teaching, maintenance of punctuality, management of classrooms with learner-centered approach, use of teaching learning materials by faculties etc. Practically the feedbacks are collected from students on annual basis and they are confidentially communicated to the teachers through the concerned HoDs for taking remedial measures in order to enhance their skills.
- **Appraisal Formats**: For promotional matters of the faculties, the office of the college uses proper Performance Appraisal Formats as prescribed by Directorate of Higher Education, Assam. The

Principal of the college certifies the promotional matters through appropriate screening of the faculties following appropriate procedure and the matters are forwarded to DHE for further grants of promotions of the faculties concerned.

To appraise the performance of the **non-teaching staff**, the college formulates the following practices:—

• **Feedback System**: The college has a process of collecting feedbacks from students as well as from faculties on office management. These feedbacks are collected annually on the grounds of performance of the office staff in matters like conduct of examinations, supporting students' requirements, solving students' academic matters etc. The feedbacks are analysed timely by the authority in consultation with IQAC. Concerning serious matters, the Governing Body of the college is also approached for adequate justification of the matters and thereby appropriate measures are taken immediately.

### 6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

### 6.4.1 Institution conducts internal and external financial audits regularly

### **Response:**

Dr. B.K.B. College conducts internal and external financial audits in a regular basis. Internal Auditor under the direction of Governing Body of the institution and External Auditor under the direction of the Director of Audit, Assam Government audit the entire financial transaction of the financial year(s) assigned and the reports received thereof are submitted to the Governing Body for necessary suggestions with a view to meeting the objections and for necessary approval as the situation demands.

Internal Audit: The Governing body accords approval to initiate the process of annual Internal Financial Audit at the end of the financial year when the proposal for the same is placed before GB by the secretary and GB appoints an experienced person for the purpose. The Accountant of the Office of the Principal responsible for maintaining accounts provides essential documents such as cashbook, receipt and expenditure with bank details to the person appointed for conducting Internal Audit. Dr. B.K.B. College conducts the Internal Audit for the financial years 2018-19, 2019-20 and 2020-21 through K. Khetan & Associates, Chartered Accountants appointed for the same and the said Audit reports are uploaded in the college website.

**External audit**: External audit is conducted by the person appointed by the Director of the Audit cell, Assam Government performed with the support of the accounts officials of the college along with the Principal. The accounts of Dr. B.K.B. College for the period from 01/04/2015 to 31/03/2018 were audited by Sri D. J. Pegu, Audit officer, under the direction of the Director of Audit (Local Fund), Assam. The audit was commenced on 16/11/2018 and completed on 30/01/2019. The Audit report of the accounts for

the said period is uploaded in the college website.

### **Mechanism of settling Audit objections:**

- During the process of External Audit to meet certain objections the Auditor serve original POS in form-C to the accounting authority of the institution and the accounting authority needs to return the same to the Auditor in course of audit.
- The Audit reports, Internal or External, are placed before Governing Body by the Secretary of the institution.
- After through discussion on the Audit reports placed GB makes necessary arrangement for meeting the objections.
- After addressing the objections the institution needs to submit before the Audit cell, Assam Government the Audit Satisfactory Replies or Report.

### 6.4.3 Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources

Dr. B.K.B College, following a Resource Mobilisation Policy, has been addressing the emerging challenges and priorities of higher education involving modernization of infrastructure and incorporation of latest educational technologies. Thus, more resources and greater alertness for management, transparency and utilization of the same determine greater amount of optimal use and overall growth of the institution.

### **6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System**

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes

### **Response:**

IQAC, established in the year 2003, has been a part of all major decisions taken and has been rendering its

services towards development and sustenance of quality in academic and administrative activities of the institution. Among the initiatives undertaken by IQAC that have been institutionalized, the following two practices are mention-worthy.

### 1. Title of the Practice: Publication of 'Khabarnama'-the Annual newsletter of Dr.B.K.B. College.

**Objective:** Since its publication in 2006, this has been an honest effort meant to project the institution through its activities and progress, inputs and outputs, research and extension works done.

**Context**: The rationale behind publishing the annual newsletter of the college entitled **Khabarnama** is to keep records of activities and achievements of the institution, to make the stake holders of the institution aware of the same and to motivate the new students to act and achieve in the same way.

**Practice**: Khabarnama is an annual newsletter published by IQAC and edited by the in-charge assigned by the authority on behalf of IQAC. All the activities organized, conducted and achievements of the students and faculties are collected through HOD, Coordinator of concerned cell, Student Union In-charge.

**Evidence of success**: Sixteen issues have been published till date.

**Problems encountered and resources required**: The institution is pleased to publish the newsletter every year and no noticeable problem is so far faced. Approximately an amount of rupees 30000/- is required for publication of Khabarnama in a session.

### 2. Title of the Practice: Student Satisfaction Survey (SSS):

**Objective**: One of the mandatory standards established by NAAC to gauge how satisfied students are with educational facilities is the SSS. The main focus of the SSS is teaching learning evaluation.

**Context**: With the aid of a carefully constructed questionnaire, SSS gathers comprehensive data about a student's satisfaction with the teaching and learning environment of the college. The replies provided by the students are gathered, processed, and evaluated to gain a clear understanding of their level of satisfaction, which aids in simplifying the services provided to them.

**Practice**: The IQAC conducts the SSS and creates the reports. With the aid of a student WhatsApp group and the college website, a well-structured questionnaire created in Google Form is distributed randomly among the students. The institution's authority receives the evaluation and the report based on the responses is finally presented to the Governing Body and various cells regarding the complaints of the students. After consultation with relevant committees, steps are taken to address the complaint.

**Evidence of success**: New infrastructural amenities including incineration machines, vending machines, disabled-friendly restrooms and ramps, skill-based courses, certificate courses, digital classrooms, etc. are added. Use of ICT tools in the classroom, online TET coaching classes were held based on the suggestions given by students.

**Problems encountered and resources required**: The pupils are not financially stable to procure stable internet services required for completion of online SSS. Insufficient support services regulating transportation, smart phones, and internet access.

### **Response:**

Dr. B.K.B. College, a rural institution, has been imparting higher education in UG level to the cross section of learners at an affordable cost through a syllabus designed by the parent university and a curriculum-extension interface at its own initiative. The College has been accelerating its activities in the post-accreditation period through a well planned curriculum-extension interface, infrastructural augmentation, digital facility and support services, opening of three new departments, introduction of Commerce stream, opening of B.Voc. in IT and Physical Education and opening of a few skill based certificate courses. The college has successfully implemented CBCS in all UG programmes as per regulations of GU. The College makes an endeavour for the optimum benefits of the students through a well chalked out mechanism that includes academic calendar, class routine, departmental initiatives, and availability of teaching learning facilities, periodic assessment and review.

### **Response:**

Dr. B.K.B. College is very much concerned with the environment and its sustainability and takes utmost care in the management of wastes generated within the campus. Basically, there are three types of manmade wastes (Solid, Liquid and E-wastes) along with wastes generated naturally at the institution. The college has a scientific waste management mechanism for proper disposal of different kinds of wastes within and outside the campus. The details of the waste management of the college are given below:

### **Solid Waste Management:**

The solid wastes (degradable and non-degradable) are segregated at source itself and for this purpose a set of two separate dustbins (around 20 big dustbins) are placed at every nook and corner of both Campus-1 and Campus-2 of the institution. The degradable and non-degradable wastes are then collected separately by the sweeper and cleaner daily. The degradable wastes are kept in the vermi-composer built inside the college campus regularly. The wet decomposed matter is used as manure for the trees and plants in the garden situated in the college campus. However, the non-degradable wastes are disposed by burning in the burning pit inside the college campus. Apart from the sweeper and the cleaner, the NCC and NSS cadets of the college are also involved in ensuring proper collection and disposal of the wastes as part of Swacha Bharat Abhiyan. Moreover, the entire college campus has been declared a plastic free zone. Big-sign boards are displayed both in the front gate and rear gate in order to discourage the use of prohibited plastic items by all concerned. Besides, notices and play cards related to the prohibition of all kind of plastics are displayed all around the college campus.

### **Liquid Waste Management:**

The liquid wastes are generated from the canteen, hostel, the lavatories etc. A drainage system is made available in the institution for the liquid wastes connecting the sources generating liquid wastes and it is drained out into soak-pit.

The waste water discharged from the water purifiers installed at different places is collected in big containers and the same is used for watering the gardens and trees, cleaning of utensils at the canteen, etc.

### **E-Waste Management**:

The E-wastes like non-working electronic devices like computer parts, printers, psychological and geographical practical devices etc. are stored in a store room. The other electric devices like fans, lights, water pumps, unused aqua-guards etc. of the college are stored in a separate store room. The reusable e-wastes are repaired regularly and reused at times and the damaged and non-functioning e-wastes are later auctioned maintaining due procedure.

The institution is very much concerned with the health and hygiene issues of the students as well as of the employees. Therefore, the bio-medical wastes like sanitary pads, bandage etc., are disposed scientifically by vending machine and incinerators both in the Girls' common room and the Girls' hostel.

### 7.2 Best Practices

# 7.2.1 Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual.

**Response:** 

**BEST PRACTICE: I** 

- 1. Title of the Practice: Dr. B.K. Barua Memorial Lecture
- **2. Objective of the Practice:** Dr. Birinchi Kumar Barua is one of the luminaries of Assam after whom the college has been named and who explored in critical dimensions the socio-cultural connections that Assam had with *Bharatabarsha* since time immemorial and its distinctive contribution to Indian identity. The series of Dr. B.K. Barua Memorial Lectures organized by the college since 2006 constitute one of the core areas of academic activities which have widely impacted the prevailing notions of culture, literature, performing arts and historical perspectives in Assam. Thus, the college fraternity tries to introduce our academic fraternity, especially the students' community to the most dynamic minds of Assam in the above mentioned fields through this memorial lectures.
- **3. The Context:** The B.K.B. College can claim the major share of introducing academic investigation and research oriented activities on Dr. B.K. Barua's overall contribution to Assamese literature, culture, society and history. Though not the only forte the memorial lectures instituted in an academic institution sometimes become the benchmark to judge its quality. But, after a series of such lectures already delivered by different academicians, scholars, historians, literary critics and environmentalists establishe the fact that this has been a healthy practice within the college premises, which brings the institution closer to the intellectual society of Assam. Our students and other stakeholders too have been familiar with the critical perspective created out of the practice. Every institution seeks to promote through its scholastic activities certain values, a genuine concern for its language, literature, culture and identity. This is the prime rationale behind instituting this series of lectures.
- **4. The Practice:** Dr. Birinchi Kumar Barua stands among the pioneers of Assamese intelligentsia and litterateurs who had created the most vibrant space for flourishing Assamese identity with its distinct regional features in a pan Indian context. The college instituted a lecture programme in admiration and memory to the contributions of Dr. B.K. Barua in 2006 and the college through IQAC and different departments, and recently through Dr. B.K.B. Study Centre has been organizing the biennial and annual lectures on different aspects of Assamese life, society, culture, economy and environment since 2006. With participation of some of the leading academicians, litterateurs and research scholars, each time with a fresh area for deliberation, the lecture series have introduced some fresh ideas and insight into the emerging areas of humanities besides evaluating the immense contributions of Dr. B.K. Barua. Details of the latest lecture programmes are as follows:

**10th November, 2014** - the fifth biennial Dr. B.K.B. Memorial Lecture was delivered by Dr. Mallika Kandali, the noted academician of performing arts and a performer of the Sattriya Dance form. She deliberated on the theme "Classical and folk-cultural Elements in the Sattriya Dance Form of Assam" with demonstration to illustrate the way how different movements and rhythms got appropriated into the texture of the Sattriya dance form.

7th November, 2015 - Dr. B.K.B. Memorial Lecture on "Birinchi Kumar Barua's Literature, Language, Culture and Practice of History" was organized to have a concentrated focus on the four

specific areas of Dr. Barua's scholarship. Four distinguished scholars from the respective domains were invited to deliberate on issues related to literature, culture, language and history. Prof. Madan Sarma and Prof. Sunil Kumar Baruah from Tezpur Central University deliberated on the literary, linguistic and cultural aspects while Laxminath Tamuly, the noted historical researcher and former IAS Officer focused on the sustained historical practices by Dr. B.K. Barua in his works.

**22nd October, 2016** - the sixth biennial Dr. B.K.B. Memorial Lecture was delivered by Dr. Anil Saikia, an academician, researcher in folklore and archivist. Dr. Saikia is widely acclaimed as the pioneer in the study of folk and modern Assamese song. He spoke on the subject of "Sociology and Aesthetics in the Folk Songs of Assam" focusing on the historical ballads that amply reveal the creative energy and concerns of the folk mind.

**26th October, 2017 -** on the closing ceremony of the year long Golden Jubilee celebration of Dr. B.K.B College several luminaries of the state attended the function and Mr. Ajit Bhuyan, a social activist and senior journalist among others delivered the memorial lecture on "Burning Issues of Assam: Insurgency and the Role of Legal and Civil Societies". Prof Gayatri Bhattacharya and Mr. Pranab Swaroop Neog also participated in an interaction with the resource person.

**6th October, 2018** - the 7th biennial Dr. B.K.B. Memorial Lecture was delivered by Mr. Mayur Bora, an Indian writer on socio-political issues and a public speaker from Assam who has authored 16 books to his credit and translated selected short stories of Dilip Bora into English. The noted author delivered the memorial lecture on the subject "**Formation of Modern Assamese Self and the Young Generation".** Mr Barua had drawn reference from the Bhakti Movement initiated by the Saint-scholar Sankardeva to situate his arguments and mostly referred to the 19th century Assamese intelligentsia for the modernist trajectory widely discernible in the first half of the 20th century.

6th November, 2019 - Dr. B.K. Barua Study Centre of the college organized the annual memorial lecture for the first time in the premises of the college and invited Prof. Prodip Khataniar, Associate Professor of Philosophy, Cotton College and a renowned bibliophile of Assam whose personal library has been enriched with more than twenty five thousand rare books to deliver the memorial lecture on "Philosophy and Literature: an Interdisciplinary approach". It was an extremely refreshing and insightful session deliberating on areas of cross fertilization. Beyond the traditional boundary of analytical philosophy, questions of being and power of imaginative representation situate a common space for literature and philosophy. Drawing critical reference from Plato down to modern philosophical premises Prof. Khataniar made certain insightful enquiry into the literary creations with reference to Assamese novels and other genres. Prof. Prabhat Bora, a renowned literary critic added his perception on the subject while making his critical observation on the lecture.

**22nd December, 2021** - the 8th biennial Dr. B.K.B. Memorial Lecture was delivered by Mr. Soumyadeep Datta, the noted environmentalist of national and international repute and a prolific author of nature writing and Buddhist culture. Mr. Dutta has been involved for decades in conservation of wildlife and biodiversity particularly in the North East region besides writing more than fifty books on nature. He spoke on "**Needs of Biodiversity and its Impact on the Assamese Life**", in the course of his speech he explained the basic concept and philosophy of biodiversity and regretted that the growth of industrialization and rampant consumerism has been a constant threat to the natural balance without which the very existence of man and other creatures would exterminate in near future.

5. Evidence of Success: The college fraternity tries to introduce our academic fraternity, especially the

students' community to the most dynamic minds of Assam, who are expertise in different fields of study through this memorial lectures. These lectures being related mainly to literature, culture, historical investigations, economy, philosophy and environmental issues, have been a source of resource material and highly beneficial to the students who practically learn a good deal of things on oratory, argumentative articulation and find a scope for interaction. These lecture programmes also help the management of the college in initiating different plans on teaching, learning, research and curricular aspects of the college and also in executing these initiatives. For an example: Dr. Mallika Kandali deliberated on the theme "Classical and Folk-Cultural Elements in the Sattriya Dance Form of Assam", with demonstration to illustrate the way how different movements and rhythms got appropriated into the texture of the Sattriya dance form at the 5th biennial lecture programme in 2014. Sattriya form of dance had its origin in the evolution of the Bhakti cult initiated by the medieval saint-poet and social reformer Sri Sankardeva and interestingly the pluralistic ethos of Indian society and culture can be explored even in the composition and evolution of its cultural heritage. As a result of this programme, the management of the college had initiated a plan immediately to introduce Sattriya Dance (under the Performing Arts Department) as a subject under the undergraduate level and introduced the subject as General/Generic and Regular Courses for the 1st time under Gauhati University in the academic session: 2015-2016, which amalgamate the Assamese culture heritage with skill components from the area of Sattriya Dance.

The college fraternity is also planning to publish an Edited Book with ISBN merging all the previous lectures delivered by different renowned and dynamic minds of Assam and thereby become accessible to all.

**6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required:** The lecture program annually involves an approximate amount of Rs. 50,000.00. So far this has been manageable for the institution.

**BEST PRACTICE: II** 

- 1. Title of the Practice: Dr. B.K.B. College Award
- 2. Objective of the Practice: Dr. Birinchi Kumar Barua stands among the pioneers of Assamese intelligentsia and litterateurs who had created the most vibrant space for flourishing Assamese identity with its distinct regional features in a pan Indian context and he hailed from the historically famous *Kharangi Barua* family of Puranigudam, Nagaon, Assam. He was a leading academician, folklorist, a renowned novelist, cultural historian and a research scholar and the people of the local society paid a tribute to this towering personality while christening the college in his name. The college fraternity has instituted an Award in the name of Dr. B.K. Barua College to provide tribute to the scholastic contributions of Dr. Baruah in the year 2016 and also to shoulder a social responsibility towards promotion of creative inspiration for those working in different areas of study, especially in the field of socio-cultural and historical studies, inculcation of values through fine arts and folk culture, economic affairs, environment and wildlife conservation, etc. The college fraternity also tries to introduce our academic fraternity, especially the students' community to the most dynamic and silent workers of Assam in the above mentioned fields through this college award.
- **3. The Context:** Dr. B.K.B. College Award instituted in 2016 has been a part of the institutional best practice and the highest academic honour offered by the college. Though it was intended to be a continuous annual practice, a decision was adopted in 2018 with procedural amendment to make the conferring of the award a biennial activity together with the biennial Dr. B.K. Barua Memorial Lecture.

The rationale for conferring this Dr. B.K.B. College Award to a committed and silent workers/researchers/academician in recognition of his/her contribution in diverse fields of study, like - Assamese culture, economy, literature, historical enquiries, environmental awareness and wildlife conservation, to encourage his/her dedication. Besides being an institutional tribute to the great departed soul of Assam, such practices remind our students and stakeholders of the great tradition of critical and creative practices of our nation. It is expected that such practices inspire the new generation to contribute in the above mentioned fields.

Initially the central focus of the award was on the unsung heroes, authors and artists who have not been recognized by the academics in an attempt to evaluate and honour their contributions. A good number of such unrecognized creative minds have been engaged in such literary, cultural and historical practices that deserve attention. In the year 2021 the selection committee decided to shift the focus from the conventional areas to the issues of environmental crises and conservation of nature.

- 4. The Practice: The college has been organizing a lecture programme annually in admiration and memory to the contributions of Dr. B.K. Barua since 2006 and also celebrated the hundred years of birth anniversary of Dr. Barua in the year 2008. Besides these initiatives, the college has introduced the Dr. B.K. Barua College Award in the year 2016. The College award merits its importance not for its content but for its keeping alive the memory of Dr. B.K. Barua and the objectives set for promotion of arts, culture, craft, economy and sustainable development far beyond the canon. The award carries a cash of Rs. 20,000.00, a citation, pieces of traditional attire and a collection of books. Though not the only forte these initiatives instituted in an academic institution sometimes become the benchmark to judge its quality. But, after a series of such initiatives to interact with different academicians, scholars, historians, literary critics and environmentalists establishes the fact that this has been a healthy practice within the college premises, which brings the institution closer to the intellectual society of Assam. Every institution seeks to promote through its scholastic activities certain values, a genuine concern for its language, literature, culture and identity. This is the prime rationale behind instituting the college award. Details of the awardees are as follows:
- **Dr. B.K. Barua College Award, 2016 -** Dr. B.K. Barua College award was offered for the first time to Chao Lokeswar Gogoi, a renowned folklorist of Assam in 2016. Mr. Gogoi has dedicated almost his entire life time and energy to the collection, documentation, analysis of materials collected from diverse ethnic communities. He believes that without participation in the community life and visiting the fields no work on folklore can be authentically carried out. Hence, he tried to understand diverse cultural resources of the folk being a part of their community life rich in beliefs, rituals and material artifice. Thus, Mr. Gogoi to his credit has authored several volumes of the folk culture of Assam, all being based on his first hand data collected from the field. His comprehensive volumes on folk culture of Assam are the monumental records of socio-cultural life of the Assamese people. His book on Architecture of the *Ahom* Period is another significant work.
- **Dr. B.K. Barua College Award, 2017 -** Dr. B.K. Barua College award was offered to Mr. Murulidhar Das for the second time in recognition and honour of his commitment and dedication to the primary field of folk life and culture. Mr. Ajit Bhuyan, the renowned journalist and social activist presented the award to him. An agriculturist turned folklorist with no formal academic degree Mr. Das's passion for folk life and agricultural occupation helped him to focus on the cultural and literary practices of the *Karbi* and *Tiwa* communities of Assam. Truly a man of the soil Mr. Das lives a very simple life with agriculture as his only means of livelihood and devotes his creative power and organizational capacity to the studies of folklore and social activities. His contribution in the establishment of Dimaria College, other socio- cultural

organizations has been well appreciated by the people of the locality and the academics for which he has been honoured with awards and literary pension. *Bhoiam Karbir lokaparampora aru geet-pad* and *Tiwa aru Karbi – Lokasanskritir Lecheri Butali* are the major works of Mr. Murulidhar das.

- **Dr. B.K. Barua College Award, 2018 -** Mr. Sushil Bora was the 3rd recipient of the Dr. B.K. Barua College award in 2018 which was presented to him at the Dr. B.K.B. Memorial Lecture programme by Mr. Mayur Bora, a noted public intellectual and author. Mr. Das had received a senior fellowship from the Cultural Department of the Central Govt. to do research on the Independence Movement of India in the undivided Nagaon district of Assam. Some of his major works of Mr. Das include *Swadhinata Sangramot Brihattar Hatichung, Sonai Parar Sabhuota, Kalongar Pare Pare, etc.*
- **Dr. B.K. Barua College Award, 2021 -** After choosing persons from the field of literature, culture and history the selection committee shifted its focus to issues related to environment and biodiversity conservation. Mr. Soumyadeep Datta is the recipient of the college award in the year 2021 in honour of his huge contribution in this area particularly habitat conservation for some of the rare endangered species, like Golden Langur and his substantial nature writings. Mr. Datta has been in the forefront of nature-movements in the entire North Eastern part of India and written more than fifty books on wildlife conservation, travel, tribal life and culture, Buddhist culture and religion. He received higher trainings from Smithsonian Institute of the USA in environmental education in 1989 and also trained in bird studies and wildlife conservation from the Zoological Survey of India. He is presently a member of the Wild Life Advisory Board of Assam.
- **5. Evidence of Success:** The college fraternity tries to introduce our academic fraternity, especially the students' community to the most dynamic minds of Assam, who are experts in different fields of study through this college award and also to bring such academicians and authors to light for wider public attention.

The practice of conferring the college award is expected to have positive impact upon all the scholars/academicians/authors/activists of Assam and it will help to bridge a way to introduce these silent workers among the young generations of the state. On the day of conferring the award there is a huge gathering of students, teachers and people from the local society and there has been encouraging coverage in the newspapers appreciating the efforts of the college towards inculcation of values.

**6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required:** The award program annually involves an approximate amount of Rs. 55,000.00. At the initial stage it has been manageable for the institution. But, along with the Memorial Lecture programme this College Award is not manageable for every year due to financial constraints and therefore this annual practice is transformed to a biennial activity with procedural amendment together with the biennial Dr. B.K. Barua Memorial Lecture in 2018 and practice will remain sustainable event in future at its own strength.

### 7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

## 7.3.1 Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words

### **Response:**

#### **Introduction**:

Every Institution of higher education excels in certain basic areas and that becomes the signature of the institution. Keeping in view the recent trends in the new millennium towards specification and specialization, we have to prepare the institution for attaining distinction in a particular dimension without compromising the basic thrust of the existing course of study. Dr. B.K.B. College is destined to work and achieve in its rural ethos.

### **Practice**:

In the post-accreditation period, the college has expanded its course of study with a view to attaining the set goals and objectives through integration of extra-curricular and extension programmes. Initially, the college had 7 departments with honours and with somewhat traditional infrastructural facilities it had to impart higher education. Besides, the college had very limited scope for skill oriented learning except what was arranged at our own initiatives - **Certificate course on Computer Application** and **Diploma in Computer Application** in 2010 and those under extension programmes.

In the present compelling situation of higher education, the college has to cope with the new demands of higher education and has accordingly mobilized resources to introduce new courses of studies like Performing Arts, Sociology and Psychology as general course of studies, and new streams like B. Com Honours (with Accountancy and Management as major subject), and B.Voc in Physical Education and **Information technology**. It is mention worthy that Dr B K B College was the first institution to introduce Performing Arts (Sattriya) and B.Voc in Physical Education under Gauhati University. In addition to this there has been a continuous effort at bridging the gap in the range of subjects being pursued by introducing several certificate and Diploma courses mostly to acquaint the learners with certain basic skills and cognitive capabilities. It is also expected that these additional courses will enable the learners deal with the untouched area of teaching and learning. The motive behind this is to create an effective and efficient teaching-learning environment and enlarge the student's participation in curriculum actions. Since the academic session 2019-2020, the college has been offering four certificate courses, namely Creative & Critical Thinking, Art of Speaking and Writing and Statistical Data Analysis for Project Report Preparation, Certificate course on Yoga for Health. However, vocationalising education with an objective to offer employability through learning by doing is another priority and thrust area of the college, which can be reflected through the introduction of two new programmes **Diploma in Sattriya Dance** with a view to providing scope for potential students excelling in dance and **Diploma in Cosmetology** with huge potentiality for self employment, in collaboration with ITI, Nagaon and NET Skill Foundation, Nagaon from the academic session 2020-21. From the current academic session onwards the institution has taken a bold initiative to introduce as many as **fifteen** certificate courses and one of them has been assigned to each student enrolled in the college at his/her choice. The rationale behind this phenomenon is to empower the learner with specific knowledge/skill/orientation to cope with the employment challenges in the new millennium.

Dr. B.K.B. College has excelled in orienting the student fraternity towards the area of social responsibility and inculcation of values indispensible for a growing citizen. An attempt has been made to integrate the incampus curricular engagements with extracurricular and extension programmes organized within and outside the campus. These programmes are chalked out before the commencement of the academic session and reflected in the academic calendar for smooth execution and expected participation by the students which are mostly conducted by different cells, committees, units and centres like NCC, NSS, Dr. B.K.B. Study Centre, Eco Club, the Women forum etc. Some significant issues dealt with through Extracurricular and extension programmes in and outside the campus are as follows –

- 1. Offering helping hands to the people in distress
- 2. Health oriented awareness programme in neighbouring community and in model village
- 3. Covid -19 awareness drive
- 4. Gender equity programme
- 5. Environment related programme
- 6. Swaccha bharat abhiyan
- 7. Academic and extra-curricular activity
- 8. Student's Capability Enhancement
- 9. Environment and Sustainability
- 10. Awareness on health and Hygiene among students
- 11. Tolerance and Harmony in multicultural ethos
- 12. Offering Dr. B K Barua College Award since 2016
- 13. Organizing Dr. B K Barua Annual and Biennial Memorial Lectures delivered by some of the eminent scholars, academicians, historians of Assam
- 14. Story telling programme in the accompaniment of classical music

### **Impact:**

Extra-curricular and outreach educational activities may either have a strong academic component or a more informal learning and development approach. These activities, when compatible and coherent with educational aims, may provide additional opportunities for young people to shine and grow with responsibility.

- Over the last 5 years, the college organized **57 extension activities** in and outside of the college campus which develops a sense of solidarity with the suffering people, inculcates human values, and strengthens community relationship among students.
- Participation in extra-curricular activities increase motivation and a sense of belonging that they might not otherwise have.
- Due to the inception new curricular and extra-curricular aspects, students got success in international, national as well as in state and inter-college level competition that shows the effectiveness of the expansion of course of study with extra-curricular extension interface. A total of 13 students awarded at international level out of 13 students. At national level out of 13 participants, 05 got medal, at state level out of 26 participants, 20 got awards and at inter-college level out of 74 participants, 09 awarded.

### **Conclusion:**

With such broader views in mind the college has mobilized its limited expertise and resources to create an interface between scholastic and non-scholastic activities. This interface achieved between Course of study

and extracurricular-extension activities forms the distinctive area of Dr. B K B College.
